

# Metal Stamping

#### •cut•

holes in blanks using a screw-action hole punch.



### •embellish•

by circling crystal cup chain and covering with resin.

# •add•

dimension by gluing stamped blanks to rings with E6000°.



#### ·hammer ·

edges and buff with a reliefing block for this distressed look.







# ·what you'll need .

- Metal stamps
- Steel bench block
  Permanent marker
- Metal blanks

· Cloth or paper towel





## tips& •techniques •

- For best results, clean the blank with rubbing alcohol before you begin.
- Before starting your project, practice stamping on a test blank.
- Firmly strike a hammer The stamp could move slightly with a second.
- Tape the blank to a steel bench block to keep it secure while stamping.
- For evenly spaced letters: Create a stamping guide by marking—in equal distances—on the tape and placing each letter above a mark.

- For aligned letters: Place the bottom of the letter just above the straight line of the tape.
- Trace impressions with a permanent marker enamel paint or patina also works—to darken. Wipe away excess color with a cloth or paper towel.
- · If you get color where you don't want it, use a metal reliefing block to sand it off.
- To achieve a distressed look, buff the blank with a reliefing block. Color with a permanent marker, and then buff the surface again.



#### •flag down•

There are no stamped-jewelry rules, so don't be afraid to add as much personality as you can muster. These blanks were given a waving effect using bail-making pliers. Just be sure to stamp first, shape second.

#### take heart

These metallic creations are worth swooning over.

Heart: two pieces of 5 mm flat wire attached with rivet (top) and wire (bottom) Cuff: bracelet blank and 5 mm flat wire layered and glued with E6000®
