VINYL TRANSFER TAPE STEP-BY-STEP

Here's a quick introduction to how to use vinyl transfer tape—
a product that makes applying vinyl to projects big or small a breeze.



Burnish transfer tape onto vinyl image until adhered. Then peel off vinyl backing.



Place vinyl and transfer tape onto surface and burnish. Then gently peel back transfer tape, ensuring vinyl has adhered to surface.



If vinyl has not adhered to surface, replace transfer tape and reburnish.

GLITTER IRON-ON



POP OF PLUSH

Bring some boutique to your bedroom with a spruced-up pillow cover (ours comes pre-pompommed). If you're using glitter iron-on material like us, make sure to place it glitter-side down on your cutting mat and reverse the design before cutting it out.

SOLID IRON-ON

IN THE BAG

If you have a little leftover fabric and a zipper, you've got the makings of a giftable (or keepable!) makeup bag. After sewing it together, add an iron-on sentiment cut to just the right size and attach a tassel (Jewelry Dept.) to the zipper pull.



SPARKLE SPACE

A jewelry dish or ceramic catchall can be a dime a dozen, but add a custom monogram in shimmer vinyl and it becomes one in a million.

Tip: Use vinyl transfer tape to apply and perfectly align multiple small pieces at once on tricky curved surfaces like these.



HEART OF IT

Who needs paint for an art canvas when you have shimmer vinyl? Big blocks of it—like a cutout of your home state—really let the sparkly material, well, shine! And since home is where the heart is, we layered on a shimmery heart cutout to mark our hometown.

STYLE PRIORITIES

Any sentiment, sweet or sassy, gets an automatic upgrade when you say it with gold foil iron-on material. Our suggestion for a no-wrinkle result: Iron the tee first and then slip it over an ironing board or place a piece of cardboard between the layers before applying the iron-on.



TRAY PUT

Weeding isn't just for gardening—it also refers to removing excess bits from vinyl cutouts before application (like the middles of our leaves). Try using a craft knife, sewing pin or tweezers to pick out the tiny parts. Supplies: wood tray, paint, removable vinyl, polyurethane sealant.



MAID FOR YOU

For a wedding keepsake she can't say no to, cut removable vinyl on your die-cutting machine and combine it with a chic tumbler from Home Decor and a gift box from Cards & Party. **Tip:** Look for fonts available through your cutting machine's manufacturer—many are free!

ALL AGLOW

When applying the most delicate of designs to your surface, use vinyl transfer tape. It prevents unruly curling and keeps things perfectly aligned for easy placement. **Tip:** Make your own candle or buy a premade one (like we did) with a removable label.

SET TO ACCESSORIZE

When you just need a little bit of vinyl to do a lot of talking, look for 12x12-inch sheets right next to the rolls—you'll find pretty patterned varieties there too! And as for the phone pocket and grip you see here, you can get those in our Wearable Art and Hobbies departments.

TAKE NOTE

Sketchbook, journal, address book, school notes—no matter what's inside, the cover will look amazing with shimmer vinyl. Our ideas: Use a favorite quote or phrase, label it with your name or the book's contents, or cut and apply a fun image (cat, robot, bicycle? It's up to you!).

SHIMMER VINYL



IN A BRUSH

You don't have to label your glass tumblers (Home Decor), but when there's shimmer self-adhesive vinyl to be used, why not? Look for it in rolls in the Paper Crafting Department.



KNOCK, KNOCK

If you need something a little more durable for your next project, pick up some permanent vinyl. It has more staying power for outdoor projects like this door greeting.

***Tip:** Just want to test out vinyl door decor for a while? Use regular self-adhesive vinyl instead.*

SPECIAL DELIVERY

Mailboxes are an ideal candidate for permanent vinyl as well. Just make sure the surface is clean and dry before applying.

PERMANENT VINYL



LET'S ADDRESS IT

Here's the how-to on this utterly charming DIY: Paint three sizes of terra cotta pots in white and gold. Once dry, apply permanent vinyl cutouts. Then fill each pot with foam and faux flowers and stack the pots, securing with hot glue if desired.
