





1. IN THE BAG

Style meets function in this macramé take on the woven handbag. The smooth simplicity of the steel ring handles is contrasted by the detailed, natural cording, giving the purse a multitextured design. And to embellish this everyday accessory, DIY a wood bead tassel.

2. CHAIN REACTION

Macramé keychains may be pocketsized creations, but they're big on style. Start by attaching the cording to a keyring with lark's head knots, then weave away. Personalize the accessories even more by adding DIY or readymade charms from the Beads & Jewelry Making Department.

3. READY OR KNOT

Add macramé to a readymade home accent like this woven basket (it comes in a set of three) to give it a custom, handmade look. Secure the cords around the top rim with lark's head knots, then work down the basket, making eight rows of Buddhist treasure mesh knots before the tassels.



4. TOP SHELF

Give a floating shelf the macramé treatment by hanging it with spiral-knotted straps beneath a decorative tapestry. This blend of cool-toned fibers (mint green and natural cording) and dark wood elements (stained dowel and shelf) brings an earthy, refreshing feel.



5. COVER UP

Sew a completed macramé piece onto a pillow cover to create a bohemian-inspired cushion full of texture, depth and natural warmth. This technique is a simple way to elevate textile pieces, like this throw pillow, and an opportunity to be intentional about using small decorative elements to contribute to the overall look and feel of a room.

6. HANG TIME

Perfect for beginners, this banner is a super approachable wall décor project because it's essentially seven mini macramé crafts. Each pennant's simple pattern incorporates a wooden bead at the center, with additional beads strung along the top to separate the panels.






7. COAST TO COAST

Craft spiral macramé coasters out of white cording, then dip-dye them to get a trendy, two-toned look. This is a quick and easy first-time project that infuses boho style and texture into a tablescape.

8. GROW FOR IT

The wood bead drawstrings on these planters keep pots snug inside the knotting and make it easy to switch out containers as the botanicals grow. Leading into the greenery, intricate squareknot patterns above the planters are balanced by long fringe below, and framed by clove hitch designs that incorporate navydyed cording for contrast.





11. WAG & WEAVE

Macramé can be so much more than just the traditional wall hanging – and this knotted leash-and-collar combo is the proof. Here, double left twist knots bookended by a carabiner and a leather strap form the leash, and the collar features square knots and a parachute buckle.



12. POWER CORD

The contrast of black and white cording draws attention to this wall hanging's multitude of layers. Emphasizing this sense of depth, the innermost panel is embellished with copper macramé tubes that direct focus toward the center of the tapestry.

Tip: Mount this elegant piece on a birch stick, allowing it to harmonize with both upscale décor and natural accents.



13. BRIGHT IDEA

The pendant's shade consists of spiral-knotted strands and half-circles made with double half-hitch knots.

14. MINT CONDITION

Horizontal clove hitches and square knots make up this two-toned tapestry.

15. LET IT SHINE

This piece is composed of diagonal clove hitches, square and half-knots throughout.
