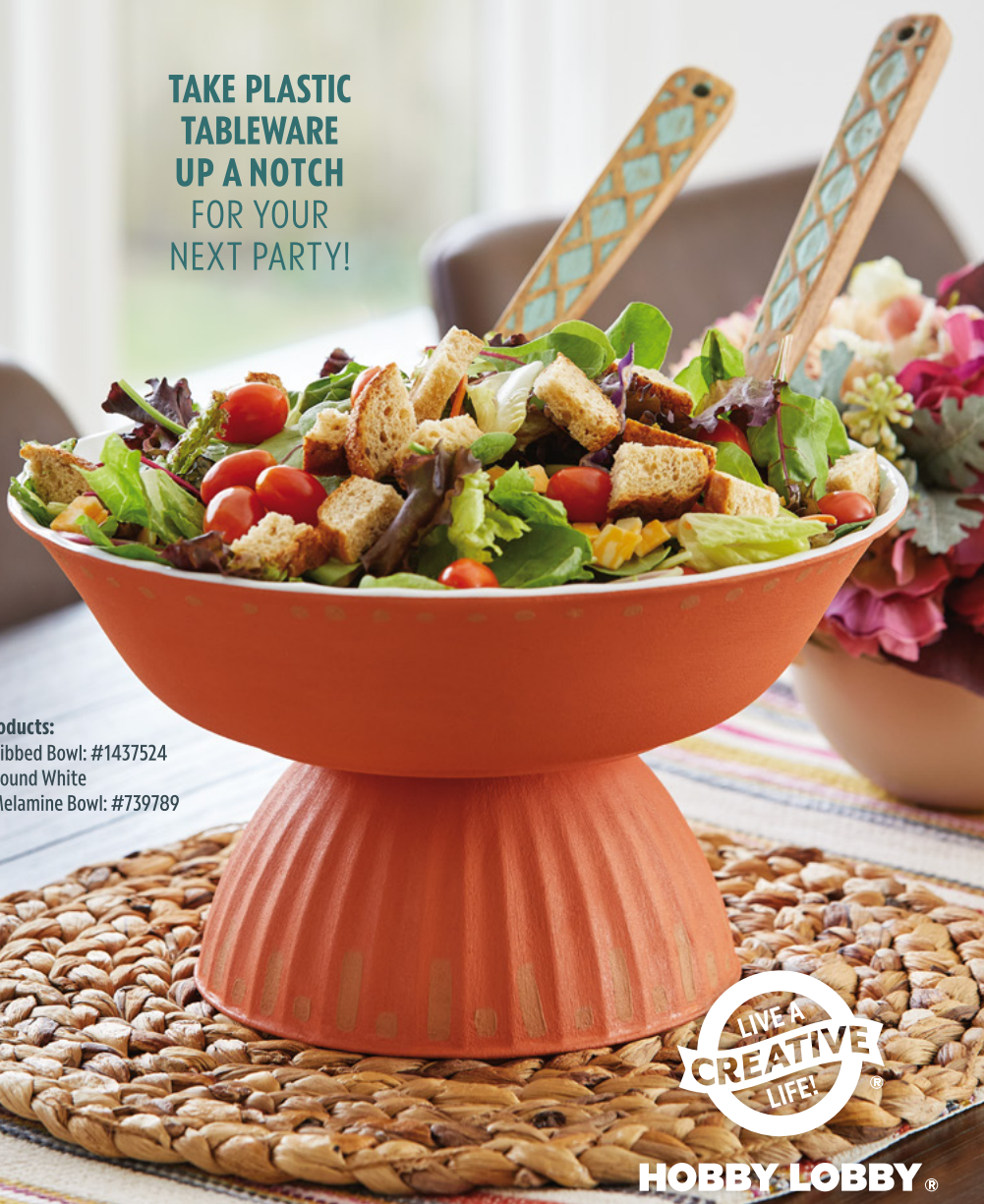

SET IN STONE

This granite-inspired serving set began as a stemmed trifle bowl and a simple candy scoop.

For the transformation:

Apply stone-textured paint to corrugated paper, and wrap it around the bowl (hiding the stem). Extend the scoop's handle with air-dry clay, and paint it to match.

MANY THANKS

Dial up the party favors with a few simple upgrades.

Popcorn: Decorate square plastic cups with stripes and labels made from self-adhesive vinyl. **Succulents:** Embellish the rims and sides of plastic appetizer cups with paint, and insert DIY'd paper flags.

NEW LEAF

These trifle bowls aren't garden-variety plasticware—thanks to some leafy customization. Glue fern picks, floral sprays and feather butterflies along the sides of the dishes, and add gold leaf to the stems.

SWEET SPOT

Here's the scoop on this **ice cream parlor look**: Try customizing a collection of plastic dessert cups with black and white squares of self-adhesive vinyl. Place them along the rim of each container, then coat the stems with metallic spray paint.

On the Cover: You can make a footed serving dish by gluing two bowls together, base to base. And for a terra cotta look, paint them with a mixture of acrylic paint and gloss glaze.

GRAB & GO

Keep gilded plastic flatware out of the drawer and at the ready with a DIY birch wood utensil holder. Cut holes in the top to hold paper cups, then add a few in-theme touches like decoupaged napkins and layered place cards.

STAMP OF APPROVAL

One way to make your mark on snack-time plasticware: a custom paint job and stamped-on designs. That's how we turned this scalloped serving container and set of square appetizer cups into botanical beauties.

Tip: Add washi tape along the paint lines to create crisp edges.

IN BLOOM

Turn basic plasticware into servingware worthy of a special occasion with fabric. Simply decoupage the fabric to the underside of the pieces—that way they're pretty *and* food-safe.

Tip: You can leave the plastic clear or color it with spray paint.

FLOWER POWER

This square plastic platter features a design created with a reverse painting technique. Start by painting clusters of dots on the underside of the tray, then add vinyl flower cutouts. Finish by filling in the flowers with acrylic craft paint.

SPOT ON

It's easy to transform an oval plastic platter into a charcuterie beauty. For this terrazzo-inspired design, paint spots on the underside of the tray and let them dry. Then paint over the spots with a light color.

KEEP YOUR COOL

Make drink dispenser covers with cotton cord (lark's head knots around the top and fringe down the sides), DIY labels and faux greenery.

Tip: For the labels, pencil designs onto birch wood coasters and trace over them with a wood-burning tool.

FRESH START

Give plastic mason jar cups an upgrade with washi tape, canvas ribbon and craft cording. Cut slits in the ribbon to create fringe, and adhere it with double-sided tape.

Then add washi tape to the jars and straws (included), and tie on a cord bow.
