## ◀ TABLE IT

This patchwork table runner features four different duck cloth fabrics. We stitched together the pieces for the top layer (mirroring the layout on either side of the stripe down the middle), then we backed it with a single panel of fabric.

## ▼ PERFECT PLACEMAT

There's always a place at the table for handmade placemats. These are made from five different duck cloth rectangles: four for the top piece and one for the back.

To give the linens more structure, back the top piece with fusible interfacing.





## SHADE FOR DAYS


Try duck cloth for a DIY shade—it's thick enough to block out the sun but still light enough to roll up when you want to enjoy the view. Here's what you'll need to make one: four window-sized fabric pieces with a  $\frac{1}{2}$ " seam allowance (one in a contrasting color), leather strips, D rings and snap rivets.



## FORK IT OVER

Fancy up your table with fabric utensil holders. For a design like ours, stitch two hexagon-shaped pieces of duck cloth right sides together (with a length of trim in between at the top). Turn the piece right side out, fold up the bottom, and stitch down the sides to create a pocket.

**On the Cover:** It takes just half a yard of fabric to make each of these reusable snack bags—you'll need one piece for the outside and one for the lining.

## IN THE BAG

This roomy market bag is both sturdy and lightweight, thanks to the flowery duck cloth on the outside and a thin broadcloth lining. Ready to make your own? Just pick up Simplicity S9298 (ours is option A).

## WARM ► HEART

To make this potholder, you'll need two heart-shaped pieces of duck cloth and four half-heart pieces. Use readymade matching bias tape for the edging, and sew the pieces with oven-safe, insulated batting in the center so the potholder can safely withstand heat.

## HOT SPOT ▼

Like the heart-shaped potholder above, you'll also need just three ingredients for this kitchen staple: duck cloth, insulated batting and bias tape. But this design requires only two pieces of the fabric (and a same-size piece of batting).
