LEAVE IT TO MOSS

Here's a unique way to make tiny trees for miniature scenes: Twist lengths of jewelry wire together to form the trunk and branches, then glue on bits of various mosses to create the canopy.





SPHERE YOU ARE ^

Mix and match moss spheres, vine topiaries and candleholders to bring a spring centerpiece to life. There's no wrong way to arrange them, but to keep the look unified, use the same elements throughout—we chose a variety of mosses and white blooms.

GREEN HOUSE ✓

Wrap mismatched containers (we used a four-compartment wood box and a terra cotta pot) in adhesive moss mats to create a cohesive look for an herb garden like this. Finish by wrapping them with chicken wire ribbon and handmade air-dry clay tags.





MOSSIN' AROUND ^

Asymmetrical moss wreath, coming right up!
Outer hoop: Accent a wood bead wreath with
adhesive moss. Inner hoop: Offset and glue two
wood rings together, then cover the space
between them with a moss mat.

GROW-IT-ALL >

Bet you can't tell this moss-covered umbrella started out as a galvanized metal planter (from the Crafts Dept.)! On the outside: reindeer moss and sections of a moss mat. On the inside: excelsior moss and floral sprays.









SMART DECO

Bring a natural element to an art deco wall piece (wood wall décor pallet + cut-to-size birch wood strips + gold leaf) with preserved forest moss.

Tip: Seal the moss with hairspray to keep it from flaking off.
