## 1. SPACED OUT

Four spacer beads on brown leather (from the round leather cord value pack) make for a sleek-and-simple bracelet—just add crimps and a lobster clasp on the ends

## 2. HOOP-LAH

This project is as easy as 1, 2, 3: 1. Weave chocolate deerskin lace through open hoop earrings. 2. Trim the ends of the cording to size.

3. Secure the ends with superglue.

## 3. PRETTY IN PINK

To cut even strands of deerskin lace for this necklace: Wrap the lace around a piece of cardboard. Then snip along one side, and voilà! You're left with cords that are all the same length.

## 4. SILVER LINING

You can recreate this layered necklace with strands of suede lace cord, long tube beads and three clasps: two ribbon pinch clasps to secure the ends of the cords together and a toggle clasp for taking the necklace on and off.

## 5. BEAD IT

Here's a hint for crafting this deerskin lace bracelet: String the tila beads onto fine jewelry thread. You can superglue pieces of lace to either end of the thread to create a seamless look.

## 6. GOLD AND BOLD

Crafting jewelry with clasps? An all-in-one cord end findings kit is your best friend—it comes with cord caps, jump rings and lobster clasps, so you'll have everything you need (just add your favorite beads).

## 7. PRETTY PEARLS

Creating intricate knots? Choose a round leather lace—it's the easiest cording to tie. You can use thin strands for delicate jewelry pieces (like earrings!) to get the warm, natural aesthetic of leather without any bulk.

## 8. TASSEL WORTHY

Soft suede fringe gives these statement earrings a textured, boho vibe. To get the look, cut suede lace into four small pieces and fold them over a jump ring. Then wrap beading wire at the top, adding a row of beads every pass around the tassel.

## 9. WRAP AROUND

Here's a hint: You can widen the holes on beads with an engraver tool to strand them onto thicker cording. We used this trick on crackled clay beads to help them easily slide onto deerskin lace.

## 10. LET IT RING

The key to these chic (but super easy!) earrings: Incorporate a mix of materials. We secured natural deerskin lace to antique-inspired hammered rings with simple lark's head knots. Just add ear wires to get them ready to wear.

## 11. KNOT FOR YOU

Cut two strands of suede lace (this medium brown shade comes in a pack of three colors) and thread both ends of each strand through a metal bead. Hook a jump ring through the loops at the top to hold the cords in place before knotting the ends at varied lengths.

## 12. THE RIGHT TRIANGLE

The pendant of this leather necklace doubles as a toggle clasp! Add spacer beads to the ends of deerskin lace, and then adhere a ring to one side and a glass stone charm to the other.

### 13. MOTHER OF PEARL

Cut two strands of deerskin lace, and then secure the ends with a cord crimp and clasp on one side and a jump ring on the other. Now it's ready for the beads! Add jasper triangles and pearls to clear cord, and string the cord between the two jump rings.

### 14. ALL THAT GLITTERS

Deerskin lace is great for customizing readymade jewelry chains! This gold bracelet has large, open links, so you can easily weave cording through it.

Glue the ends of the cord together, and add a charm to finish.

### 15. LOVELY LOCKET

This layered bracelet is two strands of leather cording held together with a lobster clasp—loop each strand around once before gluing the ends to a heart lock carabiner. (Psst! We punched holes in the leather for the charms!)
