JEWELRY — essentials—







HEADPINS

Headpins are made of flexible wire and have stoppers (called heads) at one end to keep embellishments from sliding off. We chose ballpoint headpins to hang beads from this charm bracelet, but you can also use standard headpins, which have flat heads.

> Tip: Eye pins feature a loop at one end instead of a head.



JUMP RINGS

Connecting jewelry components isn't the only reason we love jump rings, but it's a good jumping off point. To open, use chain nose pliers to pull one end of the jump ring toward you and the other away from you-twisting (not stretching) the jump rings helps it close again securely.







CRIMP BEADS & COVERS

Crimp beads are like the bookends of the jewelry world. Why? You can flatten crimp beads with a pair of pliers to secure them in place along stretch cord or beading wire-and small embellishments can't slide past them.

Tip: Conceal crushed crimp beads with covers for a more polished look.

PINCH BAILS

A pinch bail is a beginner-friendly component that allows you to attach embellishments without using jewelry tools. Align the prongs of the bail with the opening on a pendant or charm, and then pinch them together to secure. Finish by stringing chain or cord through the other end of the bail.
