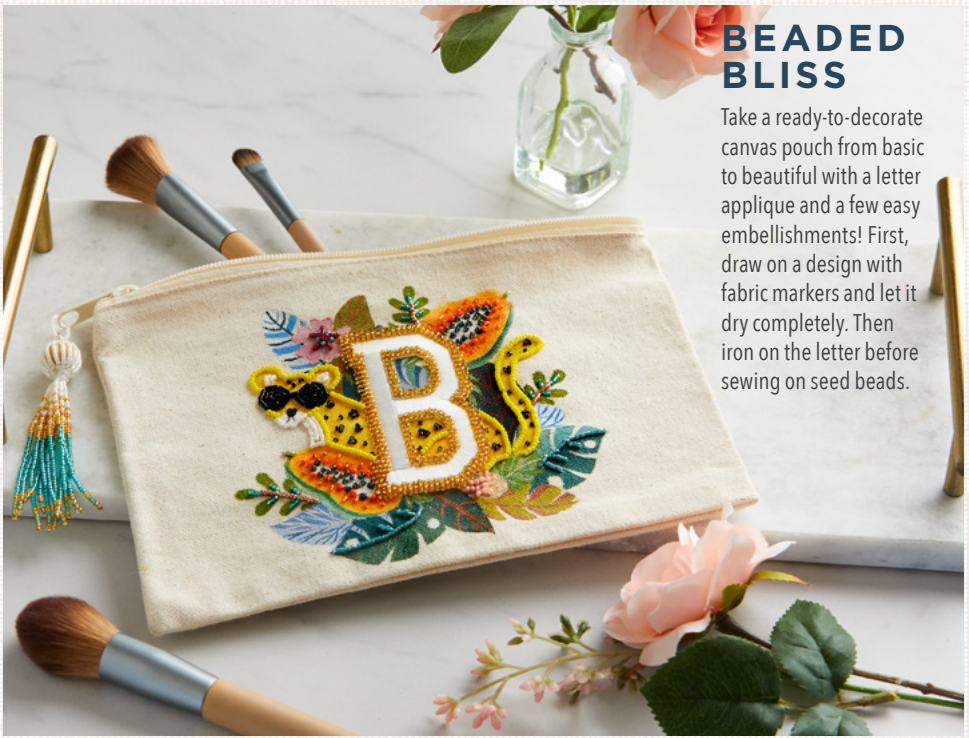

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## BEADED BLISS

Take a ready-to-decorate canvas pouch with basic to beautiful with a letter applique and a few easy embellishments! First, draw on a design with fabric markers and let it dry completely. Then iron on the letter before sewing on seed beads.



## WELL WORN

Iron-ons are a fast and simple way to monogram, personalize and embellish so many different kinds of fabrics!

**Maroon Cap:** Custom-cut initials and a circle (thanks, cutting machine!) made from white flocked iron-on (a soft, suede-like material). After ironing them on, outline the circle with rose gold glitter iron-on for a bit of sparkle.

**Blue Cap:** Block letter appliques layered over a diamond design that we cut from flocked iron-on.

**Shirt:** Lettering made from a pairing of flocked and glitter iron-on rolls.





**On the Cover:**

*Dip-dye the apron first (we went for an ombre look), and then add a phrase cut from a roll of black iron-on.*

## BEST FOOT FORWARD

Put a little pep in your step (literally!) with personalized shoes that feature alphabet iron-on transfers. To make your own, start by using fabric paint to embellish a pair of plain white sneakers. When the paint is dry, iron the letters onto the sides.

## TO THE LETTER

These letters (each sold separately) come in white with a sparkly gold trim—just color them in with fabric markers after ironing them on. Then complete the look with iron-on appliques (there are tons to choose from!) and DIY pompoms.





## BAG IT

Iron-on letters and appliques were a quick and easy way to take this tote bag to new heights—no sewing know-how needed! The colorful butterflies come together in a multipack, while the letters are sold individually. (Psst... We cut the white butterflies from a flocked iron-on roll.)

## CHEER UP

You can create outlined lettering, like the glittery phrase on this tee, by layering iron-on cutouts. Iron on the shadow first (a smooth, standard iron-on roll works best), let it cool, and then iron the second layer on top (this part can be standard or specialty iron-on). P.S. The white letters are iron-on alphabet appliques.





## SWEET SPOT

While most iron-on transfers adhere on top of fabrics, infusible ink sheets are absorbed into the material itself. That means they're great for textured fabrics, like waffle-knit kitchen towels—just apply heat to fuse your design into all the nooks and crannies.

## GIRL POWER

Iron-on embellishments can turn even the littlest outfit into a major fashion statement. The lettering and leopard spots on this teeny ensemble are from a foiled animal print iron-on roll.

*P.S. The bow headwrap and diaper cover come as a set.*
