



Leatherworking Tools

New to leatherworking? Here are the tools you'll need to get started (find them in the basic leatherworking kit)!













Flower Instructions

STEP 1: Trace a flower design onto a damp piece of leather. Tool: Blade With Modeling Spoon—For tracing patterns and guidelines onto wet leather.

STEP 2: Carve along the traced lines with a swivel knife.

Tool: Swivel Knife—A rotating knife that rests under your index finger. It's used for precise outlining and detailing.

STEP 3: Press a camouflage stamp into the leather on the outermost edges of the flower and in the curves of the bottom leaves.

Tool: Camouflage Stamp-For creating indents in large areas.

STEP 4: Press a thin pear shader into the leather to create crests in the flower petals. Tool: Pear Shader-Makes oval-shaped indents, adding

STEP 5: Stamp the outline with a thin bevel.

depth to smaller areas.

Tool: Beveler-Smooths out the outline and adds contour for a more three-dimensional desian.

STEP 6: Press a veiner into the leafy sections of the design. Tool: Veiner-A crescentshaped stamp that can be angled for several different designs. It's best for adding

STEP 7: Make seed impressions in the flower petals with a seeder tool.

Tool: Seeder—Creates small circles. Tip: Don't apply too much pressure with this toolit can damage or puncture your leather.





Better in Leather

Here's what you'll need for these statement pieces. Tassel: Tooling goatskin, suede lace, split key ring, and leather brander. Wallet: Full grain leather, stamping kit, hole punch set and rivets, and template.

The best hairstyles are layered...and so are these leather barrettes! Cut shapes from leather sheets (they come in loads of colors), then stack them and glue them to a hairclip with leather adhesive.

Perfectly Paired

Level up your accessory game with lightweight, on-trend leather earrings. You can use a cutting machine to make quick work of uniform shapes, or hand cut simple designs like these.





Strap In

Turning a single strip of uncut tooling belly into a camera strap takes a swivel knife, a beveler and a seeder.

Tip: Accentuate relief patterns by hammering a background tool around them.

Hats Off

If you're trying a variety of tooling techniques, leather patches make perfect practice! Pick up a 12-pack of blank patches, and have a go at painting (left) or burning (right) just about any design you can dream up.



INSTRUCTIONS:

- · Cut strap and strap ends from leather.
- Trace design onto strap, and then rotate 180° and trace again. Repeat for length of strap.
- Carve pattern with swivel knife, and then bevel around edges. Darken areas around design with background tool.
- · Stain leather as desired.
- Chisel stitch holes as shown.
 Note: Stitch holes on strap must align with stitch holes on strap ends.

- · Sew strap ends to each side of strap.
- Fold tabs on strap ends around pieces of leather cording and secure them by wrapping with additional cording. (Secure with glue if necessary.) Attach jump rings to leather cording with gathering knots.
- · Attach camera to strap with jump rings.




LEATHER PURSE (1 of 2)




INSTRUCTIONS:

- Cut out, chisel and hole punch pieces as shown.
 Note: Stitch holes on body must align with stitch holes on top edge of flap, sides and side straps. Stitch holes on front of flap must align with stitch holes on closure straps.
- · Add leather dye and sheen as desired.
- Sew closure straps onto flap.
- Weave flap strips through slits on flap, and then secure with rivets.
- Sew flap to body, and then add button studs and posts through holes in body piece.
- Sew sides to body, adding side straps as shown.
 Note: Ends of each side strap should be sandwiched between side piece and body piece.

- Fold D-ring loops around D-rings and secure to side straps with screw posts.
- Fold one end of shoulder strap through swivel snap hook, and then secure end with screw post.
- Thread opposite end of shoulder strap through buckle and swivel snap hook. Fold shoulder strap and fasten opposite end into buckle. Secure with screw post.
- Sew ends of shoulder strap loop together, and then slide it around folded section of shoulder strap.
- Attach swivel snap hooks on shoulder strap to D-rings on purse.





Tags Are It

Sometimes simplicity is what makes a project fly. To get this one off the ground, knot a strip of leather (dovetailing one end), add suede lace, and embellish with acrylic leather paint.
