





When Life Gives You Lemons...

...add them to your arrangement! Faux fruits like lemons and oranges add cheery contrast to a muted palette of tulips, dahlias and roses.

Tip: Faux fruit may be heavier than flowers, so attach them with floral tape for a secure hold.

Fern-tastic!

Greenery is an important layer for supporting your blooms. Here, bunches of mini ferns complement calla lilies, protea stems and gerbera daisies in a statementmaking vase.







Ceramic Pot, Floral Foam Block, Compound Wire Cutter, Magnolia Stem, Cosmo Spray, Thistle Spray, Stephanotis Spray, Mimosa Spray, Ash Leaf Spray



STEP 1:

Cut floral foam block to fit, place inside vase, and insert magnolia stems (primary florals) into foam block.





STEP 2:

Arrange thistle sprays (secondary florals) around magnolia stems, then layer in cosmo and stephanotis sprays (smaller secondary florals).



⇒ STEP 3: *≤*



Add mimosa sprays (filler florals) near base and around primary florals to build volume, then fill out arrangement with ash leaf sprays (greenery).

Note: Sprays should spill over vase.





Flower of the Flock



Looking to show off large flowers like magnolias? Opt for a loose horizontal design-it leaves plenty of space to spotlight those bigger, attention-grabbing blooms! Plus, you only need a few to make a big impact.





Asymmetrical designs are a fan-favorite for creating visual interest! Case in point: Tall branches like delphinium and larkspur create a sense of balance when diagonally offset by cascading clematis.





Spring Fever

Take the guesswork out of floral arranging by displaying individual blooms (orchids, carnations, and daisies are stunning standouts!) in a collection of small glass vases.

Hint: Try spray painting mismatched containers to suit your color palette.



On the Cover: For an airy arrangement, delicate flowers (baby's breath, cosmo sprays, lace fern) are your best bet. Choose a vase with a wider opening to allow blooms to fan out and leave plenty of breathability.

Tropical **Paradise**

Gladiolas, birds of paradise, anthuriums and orchids offer a hefty dose of eyecatching colors and textures.

A helpful tip:

Arrangements like this one call for tall, showstopping branches that are two times the height of your vase.





Smell the Roses



When creating shorter arrangements, fullness is key. A tight, rounded design with symmetrical elements is a simple-yet-elegant take on a timeless rose and ranunculus bouquet.
