IRON-ON INSTRUCTIONS

Iron out all the details for creating your own custom t-shirt! **Tip:** *Wait at least 24 hours after applying iron-on to wash t-shirt. This gives the adhesive time to set.*

SUPPLIES

- T-Shirt (Prewashed)
- Iron-On
- Cutting Machine and Mat
- Heat Press and Mat
- Weeding Tools
- Heat-Resistant Paper
- Scrap Collector

STEP 1

Cut iron-on with cutting machine according to manufacturer's instructions, then weed excess iron-on from design.

STEP 2

Pre-heat t-shirt. Position cut design (liner side up) onto t-shirt. Place heat-resistant paper over design and apply heat press according to manufacturer's instructions. Remove plastic liner from t-shirt. Repeat for additional iron-on, working from bottom layer to top.



On the Cover: *Be sure to mirror your design if it includes words so the saying won't appear backwards when it's applied.*

Tip: *For best results, you'll want to use a heat press machine for these projects, but you can also use a handheld press—just be sure to apply consistent medium pressure.*





TO A T!

There are two reasons to pre-wash your fabric before applying iron-on: 1) it adheres better to a clean surface, and 2) if your fabric shrinks in the wash, you'll want that to happen *before* adding the design, not *after*.

OH, BABY!

The size of your project determines the type of heat press you'll want to reach for. A small, handheld press works best for navigating tiny spaces and getting in between large seams, like on these adorable creepers.





PICTURE PERFECT

Iron-on sampler packs eliminate the guesswork in creating a color palette for your embellishments. Each pack includes three cohesive colors—like the lavender, light pink and mint on these photo albums!

SOLE MATES

Iron-on adheres to canvas like a dream—so you can level up a plain pair of sneakers (Wearable Art Department) with just fabric paint and iron-on flower cutouts. The result: a shoo-in for your new fave footwear!



Tip: To help shoes hold their shape when adding iron-on embellishments, stuff them with tissue paper.

GROOVY IN GLITTER

Iron-on for fine art projects?

Far out! Combine glitter iron-on, watercolor paper and paint to create your own dreamy disco wall art.

RAISE THE FLAG

Iron-on and felt sheets are all you need for these DIY pennants. The lettering is glitter iron-on, but you can choose from foiled, holographic, and even glow-in-the-dark varieties.



Tip: Avoid adding layers on top of glitter iron-on—the design may peel.

GARDENING GO-TO

You'll need to break out the weeding tools to clean up all the tiny details in these iron-on garden designs. So before you reach for a shovel and rake, get to work with a weeder tip, hook or tweezers!



HEAD START

For elastic clothing and flexible surfaces, sport iron-on is your go-to! It's thin, lightweight and made to stretch—which means the designs on these beanies stay crinkle-free.
