



BUSY BEE

Safety takes priority in wood-burned projects! To avoid melting a plastic stencil, trace the design in pencil first. Then remove the stencil before picking up your wood-burning tool.

Tip: Daubers are used to apply paint in an up-and-down dabbing motion and are the perfect tool for most stencil projects.

GRAB A TISSUE

Add some dimension to your stenciled projects by swapping paint for texture paste. Once the paste is covering the surface, carefully remove the stencil and allow the paste to dry.





HAVE A SEAT

The flowers adorning this botanical barstool were chosen from a sheet of 12 reusable adhesive stencils. Just peel away the elements you want to include, and replace them afterward for your next project.



FUNGI & FRESH

When working with intricate stencils and multiple colors, overloading your brush with paint can lead to bleeding and smudging. Instead, build up opacity in thin layers to ensure clean and crisp lines.

HELLO, STENCILS!

The key to a customized coir doormat: lots and lots of paint! Fill in stenciled (daisies) or freehand ("hello") designs by dabbing craft acrylics into the coir material, layering until you achieve full coverage.





ARTFUL OUTLOOK

Securing your stencil is a must when you're working on a vertical surface. Repositionable spray adhesive makes it easy to move stencils around multiple times—like when you're creating "wallpaper"!
