Tie-Dye Designs!



ARTSY APRON

Here's what you'll need to whip up this DIY...so you can whip up some sweet treats in style: a white apron, a tie-dye kit and flocked iron-on. Because when it comes to embellishing tie-dye creations, iron-on designs take the cake.



NEAT & TIE-DYE

Tie-dye + white napkins = a match made in craft day heaven. Just grab a tie-dye party kit (it comes with instructions for the ombre technique on these linens) and some embellish-ready napkins, and you're on your way to a handmade feast for the eyes.

PILLOW TALK

Cozy up a reading nook with a hand-dyed pillow! For a gradient pattern like this, sandwich a folded pillow cover between two pieces of wood and secure with rubber bands—this will keep dye from getting to the innermost parts of the fabric—then dip the “sandwich” in dye.



HATS OFF

Unlike other dye techniques, the beginner-friendly method of spraying damp fabric with dye doesn't require any tying, folding or wrapping whatsoever. Not-so-flexible accessories (Exhibit A: a baseball cap) are the perfect candidates—simply soak, spritz, and set!



GOOD HAIR DAY

Finish off your hairdo with these tie-dye duos that are guaranteed to catch eyes.

Multipacks of scrunchies and headbands, as well as a rainbow's worth of dye options, means lots of opportunities for displaying your unique style.

ON THE COVER:

The key to the table runner's design is to fold it like you're making a paper football—fold one corner to the opposite edge and then continue folding until you reach the end of the runner.





PATCH PERFECT

It's time to let your sock drawer in on the tie-dye fun! You can get abstract, speckled designs like these by reserving some of the dry dye to sprinkle onto the socks after they're spritzed with wet dye. Then be sure to grab a few iron-on patches to add extra flair.

SHOE CREW

A couple ways to kick up the wow-factor on footwear:

- 1) Dry coloring—applying dye directly to your shoes without wetting them—gives you clean color lines.
- 2) On the other hand, soaking the shoes in water first creates a watercolor effect.





BAGGING RIGHTS

The monstera motifs on this canvas tote come from a resist technique. Draw your patterns with a fabric marker, then fill them in with a generous amount of tacky glue and let it dry. After dyeing the tote, rinse it under warm water until the glue rubs off.
